Year 13 and 14

The GCE Art and Design specification is available at two levels: AS and A2. Students can take the AS course as a final qualification. Students who wish to obtain a full A level qualification must also complete the A2 course. The AS units make up 40% of the full A level qualification, and the A2 units make up 60%.

Students will follow a broad pathway through Art, Craft and Design studying the Combined Studies GCE. Working with a wide range of media, materials and processes, students will gain insight and understanding into one of the fastest growing career pathways, developing a wide range of skills essential for a future in creative and other industries.

Pupils will continue to build upon the knowledge and skills previously acquired at GCSE, taking inspiration from the world around us, using a wide range of available technologies to produce work in both two and three dimensions.

The course has **four** units: **two** at AS level and **two** at A2:

Year 13

AS Unit 1: Experimental Portfolio

Students base their portfolio on a theme that we issue in a stimulus paper at the beginning of the AS course.

AS Unit 2: Personal Response

This unit is available from 1 February each year.

In this unit, students respond to a theme that is issued in a stimulus paper at the beginning of the AS course. It includes developing work into an outcome that stems from the research and exploratory work completed for their Unit 1 Experimental Portfolio. It is important that students develop a clear understanding of how their outcome would fit into a real world context.

Year 14

In Year 14 the A2 qualification is made up of two further units of work.

A2 Unit 1: Personal and Critical Investigation -This unit includes both practical and written investigations and includes contextual research. Students demonstrate understanding through integrated practical and written forms.

Students choose the medium and can present their work in a variety of forms including:

- A written investigation
 of 1000 2000 words;
- folder;
- web page;
- exhibition of work;
- work journal;
- sketchbook
- CD; and/or
- any combination of these.

A2 Unit 2: Thematic Outcome Students respond to a theme that we issue in a stimulus paper at the beginning of the A2 course.

GCE Business Studies



Year 13

In Year 13 students are introduced to the World of Business. Teaching within the Business Studies Department of Carrickfergus Academy is specifically designed to embrace the rich Northern Ireland Business landscape and to incorporate current business affairs.

Students will have the opportunity to undertake three units of study which will lead to their AS/Certificate in Business and contribute to their final overall A2/Extended Certificate qualification. Students will focus on a combination of three of the following key themes:

The Business Environment

This unit introduces students to the business world and the services which are offered. Students will investigate a number of local businesses and explore a range of techniques adopted by each.



Finance

In this unit students will focus on financial planning, analysis and decision making within a business. Students will explore sources of finance, financial management, budgeting, cash flow, financial statements, investment appraisal and ratio analysis.

This unit provides students with the opportunity to investigate factors contributing to the success of businesses, focussing on the role of managers, supervisors and employees. They consider how businesses organise themselves and will analyse and evaluate the effectiveness of these organisational structures.

Human Resources

The purpose of this unit is to focus on the human resources side of business. Students will consider organisational structure, culture, recruitment, training, staff wellbeing, motivation and conflict within business.

Entrepreneurial Opportunities

In this unit students develop an understanding of entrepreneurial opportunities and investigate how individuals can exploit these through personal enterprise. They consider opportunities for personal enterprise for a given context and propose marketing and operations activities to take advantage of entrepreneurial opportunities.

Year 14

In Year 14 students will be introduced to more varied and wider areas of Business. They will undertake another three units of study which will be added to their AS/Certificate units to make up their A2/Extended Certificate grade. Students will focus on a combination of the following key themes:

Business Technology

The purpose of this unit is to help students understand the range of technology and IT systems available for communication, managing people, financial management and business operations.



Developing a Business Proposal

Students will develop, present and evaluate a business proposal. Students will have a valuable opportunity to present their final outcome to the Small Business Advisor of Danske Bank, Carrickfergus.

Management/Managing and Leading People

In this unit students explore how organisations operate in a changing business environment. They will examine the key concepts of leadership and management. This will include topics such as leadership styles, theories, managing teams, performance management and managing change.

Marketing Communications

Students will investigate the use of marketing communications by small businesses, develop a marketing communications mix for the business proposal and recommend a schedule of marketing communications.

Project Management

The purpose of this unit is to provide students with the opportunity to make use of all the key information they have studied in other parts of the course. It will allow students to study all aspects of how a business is run. Students will plan, organise and run a mini-enterprise. This is a fun unit which can become very competitive, just like the real world of business.



Assessment Models

This is a two-year course and over that time students will complete six units of study. Assessment in Year 13 and Year 14 will include External Examinations, Internal Portfolios and External Assignments.

How many hours per week will I need to study?

Pupils receive 9 periods per week of taught lessons.

Reading, annotation, research, essay writing and revision will form the basis of the homework set. The amount of time spent on these will be up to the pupil, but are likely to mean a further 6-10 hours per week of study (some of which can be done in private study periods)



What can I do with a qualification in Geography?

Many geography students go on to have successful and interesting careers in a wide and diverse range of areas such as urban planning, cartography, GIS applications, climatology, environmental management, weather forecasting, research, teaching and demography. Others use the skills acquired through the study of geography to pursue careers that require similar skills, for example, GIS related jobs, which is a growth area.

Government and Politics

Why should I study Government and Politics?

Why study Politics? Simply because it affects everything you do! The age you can marry, join the armed forces, vote and drive, are all determined by politicians. What drugs are classified as legal or illegal, how animals are transported and killed, how much you can legally drink and drive? These are all things politicians decide when they make laws. It is important that you have your say on current political issues such as Brexit, Covid 19, Donald Trump and the other social and political issues that dominate the news.

Politics is alive!! Politics inevitably involves differences of opinion and trying to seek agreement in order to resolve those differences. Politics will get you thinking!

No prior knowledge is required, however a C grade in English is recommended. Students who have enjoyed subjects such as History, R.E, English Literature and LLW often enjoy studying Politics.

Government and Politics is also a good choice if you enjoy taking part in discussion, debating or simply expressing your opinion!

The CCEA A Level Course in Government and Politics is broken up in to two AS modules studied in Year 13 and two A2 modules studied in Year 14.

AS 1: The Government and Politics of Northern Ireland

AS 2: The British Political Process

In Year 14 two further modules are studied

A2 1: US Politics
A2 2: Political Ideas





Each year Government and Politics students from Carrickfergus Academy take part in a study visit to the Northern Ireland Assembly and the Houses of Parliament in London.

On these visits pupils are given an insight into the workings of our political institutions and have the opportunity to watch live political debates. Students also take part in question and answer sessions with MLAs and MPs from a range of political parties, giving you the chance to put your views across to the people in power. Our trip to London includes of course some essential political sightseeing to places such as Downing Street and Buckingham Palace, and we usually fit in a few other fun activities as well!

So why study A-level History?

- History provides you with skills which are relevant to lots of professions.
- History graduates are able to think analytically for themselves, weigh up sources of evidence, structure their thoughts effectively and write informative reports/presentations. You will be learning about key events which shaped the world we live in.
- If you enjoy History then you should consider doing A-level History.



In ICT pupils will follow the OCR Cambridge Technicals specification and will be assessed in 6 coursework units. It is recommended that pupils have studied ICT at GCSE if considering this course. Due to the coursework based nature of the course it is recommended pupils have at least a C in English to enable them to gain a good grade for their written communication skills.

This vocational course is the equivalent of an A-Level, recognised by both Queens University Belfast and University of Ulster for ICT based degrees. This specification is 100% coursework based.

Coursework units

Unit 1 - Communication and Employability Skills for IT

This unit will enable you to create ICT documents for certain audiences. It will also allow to learn about different personal skills that are essential within the ICT industry. You will then learn about the different methods of ICT communication and be able to demonstrate ICT skills.



Unit 2 – Information Systems

This unit allows the student to demonstrate the information organisations hold and how this is valuable to an organisation. It will help the student understand the legislation governing information which goes in and out of an organisation and the constraints and limitations that apply to it. Students will discover that if systems are in place, and information held is correct then the communication within the organisation is a powerful tool and can give any organisation a competitive edge with the use of management information systems.

Unit 12 - Website Production

This unit will prepare students to design, create and test a fully functioning professional website, that uses a range of advanced and dynamic features. It also provides essential knowledge on the architecture, design and security issues that need to be considered when creating websites. Pupils use WordPress to create their websites, equipping them with skills that can be used in industry.



Unit 19 - Spreadsheet Modelling

The aim of this unit is to help students understand how spreadsheets can be used to solve complex problems. Students will learn how to create a complex spreadsheet model and to use a range of formulae and functions. They will also learn how to automate and customise their spreadsheet models, the importance of testing spreadsheets for functionality and produce relevant documentation to support the spreadsheet.

Unit 27 – Digital Graphics

This unit helps students learn advanced skills in Photoshop, skills that are used in the graphic design industry. Students will complete 4 mini Photoshop tasks demonstrating a range of skills, and then complete a major task - planning, designing and evaluating a variety of graphic design products for a given scenario. In addition, students will learn the theory behind this area of ICT, including the hardware and software used in graphic design and the properties of various file formats and print mediums.



Unit 43 - Understanding Social Media for Business

This unit gives students the understanding of what social media is, the scope and impact it has, how it is evolving and the opportunities these platforms provide to businesses when promoting themselves or utilising consumer information. By reviewing business practice students will be able to identify how to improve service and customer delivery, raise awareness of business and products/services and improve market intelligence to develop a competitive advantage.



Year 13

Unit 1: Investigating the Media

Written examination: 2 hours 30 minutes.

24% of qualification.

The examination assesses media language, representation, media industries, audiences and media contexts.

It consists of three sections:

<u>Section A: Selling Images – Advertising and Music Video</u>

This section assesses knowledge and understanding of media language, representation and audiences in relation to advertising or music video.

There is **one** question based on unseen print or audio-visual resource material.

Section B: News in the Online Age

This section assesses knowledge and understanding of media language, representation, media industries and audiences.

There is **one** two-part question requiring reference to the set news products studied.

Section C: Film Industries - from Wales to Hollywood

This section assesses knowledge and understanding of media language, media industries and audiences.

There is **one** two-part question requiring reference to the set films studied.

Unit 2: Media Production

Coursework: 16% of qualification

- A media production, including individual research and planning, created in response to a choice of briefs set by WJEC, and applying knowledge and understanding of key concepts.
- An **individual** reflective analysis of the production.

Year 14

Unit 3: Media in the Global Age

Written examination: 2 hours 30 minutes.

The examination assesses media language, representation, media industries and audiences. Unit 4: Creating a Cross-Media Production

Coursework: 24% of qualification

- A cross-media production, including individual investigative research and development, created in response to a choice of briefs set by WJEC and applying knowledge and understanding of key concepts and digital convergence.
- An **individual** critical analysis of the production.





GCE Religious Studies




Year 13

A-Level Religious Studies is a rigorous examination of the growth of early Christianity and the threats which faced this new movement in its infancy as well as the understanding the continued impact of faith and suffering in the wider world today. The two modules complement each other very well and follow similar themes which help to aid overall understanding. A-Level RS is a similar discipline to History or English Lit. and can lead to many different avenues of employment.

AS students will study two modules worth 40% of the overall A-Level mark.

AS Module 2 - An Introduction to the Acts of the Apostles



This module includes a study of the background to Acts, the beginnings of the Christian Church, growth and expansion of early Christianity as well as a study of Paul the apostle and the broader themes of faith and witness in Acts.

AS Module 4 - The Christian Church in the Roman Empire: Beginnings, Expansion and External Pressure

A study of the expansion of Christianity, Church organisation and Government, persecution of the early believers, Emperor Constantine (The first Christian Emperor) and some early Christian thought (including Clement, Ignatius and Justin Martyr).

Each of the above modules are externally assessed by CCEA examinations. Each examination of 1hr 20 mins is worth 20% of their overall A Level grade.

Year 14

A2 continues the story begun in AS with a further two modules worth 60% of the overall A- Level mark.

A2 Module 2 - Themes in Selected Letters of St Paul

This unit builds on the study of Paul's missionary activity completed at AS level. Students explore Paul's role as an evangelist in greater depth through his letters to the churches established during his missionary journeys in Acts. Students engage in detailed study of three New Testament texts and critically assess the importance of Paul's



teaching for early Christian communities and the Church today as well as examining the problem of religious controversy and highlight some potential areas of conflict.

A2 Module 4: - Themes in the Early Church and the Church Today

The first two sections of this unit consist of themes in the early Church

followed by a section dealing with belief and belonging in the modern world. Students study the changing nature of authority and Church government and the challenges of heresy. They link these to leadership, organisation and challenges to belief. In the final theme on faith, morality



and the state students consider the relationship between religious faith and state authority.

Each examination of 2hrs is worth 30% of the overall A Level grade.

MINIMUM ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: 'B' in GCSE History or English Literature is required.



Sport Studies



Single Award

Sports studies Level 3 National Extended Certificate is a single award vocational qualification which aims to provide students with the opportunity to access a career in the sport, health or leisure industries.

The course is studied over a 2-year period and is 100% coursework based. Assessments will be on a continual basis throughout both years of study. It is the equivalent to 1 A Level.

You will study 3 units over 2 years:



Why choose Level 3 Tourism?

The WJEC Level 3 qualifications in Tourism are designed to provide learners with the underpinning knowledge, understanding and skills associated with tourism organisations and activities. The qualifications will provide a broad basis for further or higher education or for moving into employment.

What will I study?

- The types of tourists and UK tourism destinations
- Tourism employment options within the UK industry
- The motivation for travel and the range and appeal of worldwide tourism destinations
- Marketing campaigns for tourism destinations
- The of external pressures and changing customer needs and expectations

How will I be assessed?

The WJEC Level 3 Applied Diploma in Tourism is made up of four units (360 GLH: two Certificate units – completed in Year 13 plus two further units). All units are mandatory.

Unit 1: The United Kingdom Tourism Product (External exam – 90 minutes – short and extended answer questions, based on applied context, completed in Year 13)

Unit 2: Worldwide Tourism Destinations (Internally assessed and externally moderated. All assessments conducted under controlled assessment conditions, completed in Year 13)

Unit 3: The Dynamic Tourism Industry (External exam – 90 minutes – short and extended answer questions, based on applied context, completed in Year 14)

Unit 4: Event and Itinerary Planning (Internally assessed and externally moderated. All assessments conducted under controlled assessment conditions, completed in Year 14)
